


Here is the brief for Friday 5 February 2021.

**COVID-19 vaccination programme – recruitment** Information was circulated in the brief on Monday 1 February, giving current staff the opportunity to offer hours in support of the vaccination programme. Due to the number of emails received from colleagues in Acute Services we are amending the process for this sector **only**. Effective immediately, all Acute colleagues wishing to offer hours to the vaccination programme should seek support from their manager before passing their details to their Service, who will in turn pass it to their Division for sending to the Deployment Hub. **Please do not send to, or copy in, the ARI Control Room email address.** Please refer back to the brief issued on Monday 1 February and the accompanying attachment for further information.

**COVID-19 vaccination programme – information for the public** We shared the following information with the general public via our social media accounts; it may also be of use and interest to you as health & social care staff. The patient information leaflet which accompanies appointment letters for COVID-19 vaccination states: *People with bleeding disorders or people taking medication to thin the blood or reduce bleeding should consult their specialist for advice on vaccination.* NHS Grampian advise not to phone your GP.


- Patients who are prescribed blood thinning medication including warfarin, aspirin, clopidogrel, rivaroxaban, edoxaban and apixiban should not be concerned about receiving the COVID-19 vaccine and should attend their appointment to receive this important immunisation.
- There is no need to contact your general practice for advice regarding blood thinning medication prior to attending for COVID-19 immunisation.
- Vaccinators will ask a question related to this prior to administering an injection.
- Patients on blood thinning medication may bruise more readily, the vaccinator will simply apply pressure after immunisation to the injection site for a bit longer than average. Reassuringly, the needle the COVID-19 vaccine is given with is very small and causes minimal trauma.
- If the individual receives medication/ treatment to reduce bleeding, for example treatment for haemophilia, intramuscular vaccination can be scheduled shortly after such medication/ treatment is administered. Please call the number on your letter to rearrange your appointment if required.

**The rise and fall of COVID-19** The graph below shows the number of COVID-19 cases reported to the contact tracing system since the Aberdeen City outbreak in August.

Daily covid-19 cases and 7 day rolling average



The ‘bump’ in October was associated with the return of university students, and from early November there was an inexorable rise in numbers, with large spikes following the Christmas and New Year periods. The graph demonstrates convincingly the effect of complete lockdown starting on 5 January. In December there was an average of 2.5 contacts of each case, whilst in January this had fallen to 1.3 contacts per case. So, the Grampian population are to be congratulated for their adherence to the lockdown restrictions, but case numbers are still higher just now that they were in March, August and October, and so continued vigilance and adherence to the restrictions remain vitally important.


